On Thursday the 22nd of December 2022 we had our annual Christmas party. This year was the first Christmas party since Covid-19.



The Battle of Culloden

The Battle of Culloden was the final confrontation of the Jacobite rising of 1745

Charles Edward Stewart also known as Bonnie prince Charlie was the head of the Jacobite army. He was defeated by the British government forces under Prince William Augustus duke of Cumberland on Drummossie Moor near Inverness

What happened to Bonnie Prince Charlie after Culloden? When Prince Charles escaped from the battlefield at Culloden, he left almost all his personal possessions behind. During the months that followed he was hunted by government forces throughout the western Highlands and Isles.



Many years later, Bonnie Prince Charlie, by then a hopeless alcoholic, died in Rome of a stroke on 31 January 1788, aged 67.

The history of Red castle

A brief intro of the castle



Red castle is historically known as Edirdovar and Ederdour, It's a mediaeval castle in killearnan on the Black isle, Northern Scotland. It is so named from the colour of the stone of which it is built. The castle is now in a state of ruinous disrepair, although it is protected as a category B listed building.

The structure has a L-shaped floor plan and is approximately 3-stories. It does not have a roof at this time.

History of the castle

Red castle was until relatively recently one of the oldest inhabited houses in Scotland. A castle on this site was first constructed by William the lion in 1179 and was known as Edirdovar. The castle was held by sir john bysset 1230 and in 1278 by Sir Andrew de Besco. In 1455 the black isle was annexed to the crown.



By 1492 the castle and its lands were under the control of Kenneth Mackenzie, 7th of Kintail and they remained in the possession of the clan Mackenzie until 1790. The present building is dated 1641 but incorporates earlier work of rubble and ashlar masonry which is typically associated with older structures. Additionally, the castle was remodelled in the 19th century by William Burn. The estate was bought by Colonel H.D. Ballie in 1838 and passed into the ownership of the family of Lord Burton of Dochfour. The castle was requisitioned by the army during World War 2 and was finally vacated and part stripped in the 1950s.

Fire station

On Thursday the 9th of March, we went to the fire station for a visit. Two of the firefighters came out to meet us. They took us to the lecture rooms where they talked to us and told us all the things we would see. They took us around the building they explained as they went through all the different equipment and how it worked. The firefighters were very nice and they answered all our questions.

After the tour we moved on to the demonstration which was the best part of the tour I think. First they showed us what they wear on the job. In an old car they showed us how to take a door off using cutting tools, they got into a car to save people. It was very fast. They also broke some windows to show us the fast ways of getting to people. They tested the fire alarms to make sure it was okay for everyone and not too loud.



We were shown fire engines and the storage of hoses, first aid bags, all the cutting tools and equipment they needed. We were also taken to the boat used for sea rescue, as they work, alongside the RNLi (royal navy lifeboat institute)

We returned to the lecture room and we had a demonstration about breathing apparatus which looked very scary.

I think they do a very difficult job and we need them very much.
